When and Where Is Curbside Pickup Available?

Curbside Pickup will be available at all 12 of our [community libraries](#) three days per week: Tuesdays from 3-7 PM, and Thursdays and Saturdays from 10 AM-2 PM.

How Does Curbside Pickup Work?

1. Search our online catalog at [smcl.org](#) and place your items on hold.
2. When your hold arrives at the library location, you'll receive a notification that your item is available for scheduling a pickup time.
3. Use our [online calendar](#) to schedule your pickup time or contact our [Customer Care Team](#) by calling 833-YES-SMCL or texting (650) 851-0147.
4. You'll receive a confirmation email containing the date, time, and location of pickup, as well as location-specific pickup instructions.
5. On the day of your pickup, your items will be checked out and placed on a designated pickup table and labeled by last name, first initial, and last four digits of your phone number.


Celebrate Pride Month
